- IV. Guest Speakers

A. State of our Unions - David Hecker, former president of American Federation of Teachers Michigan (AFT Michigan)

Barry Lepler introduced David Hecker as a highly influential Democrat who has been a leader in the labor movement for decades. With a family background of labor activists, David served the AFT for 27 years—22 years as president—and 40 years in the labor movement until he retired. Trade unionism is in his DNA. This is an exciting time for the labor movement as it has 71% popularity and organizing is more visible than ever. There are two reasons for this: corporate greed both in the public and private sector and increasing attacks on working people. The movement strives to be transformational—proactive, not just reactive—and self-reflective. The goal is to build an active, powerful membership that works for the common good and to create a better society and world. Working with other organizations to build relationships is key. Organized labor has accomplished a lot to date but must continue to work on becoming more transformational in the future.

MI State Representatives Regina Weiss, Natalie Price, and Jason Hoskins presented David Hecker with two tributes/plaques from the state of MI to honor his lifetime achievements and to celebrate his retirement.

B. Mary Kovari, OCDP Education Committee

Mary Kovari is an educational consultant and coach. Her focus is on school board elections (on behalf of the OCDP Education Committee). Dem clubs should network with each other to work toward achievement and improvement in the schools. Mary's ask: that each Dem club in OC send a liaison to the OCDP Education Committee to evaluate candidates for school boards and be part of that election process. VIII. Elected Officials' reports

Rep. Regina Weiss, 6th District: A great deal has been going on in Lansing both with regard to bills passed and ongoing work: revision/reform of auto no-fault insurance re: catastrophic auto claims; reproductive health act; teacher evaluation reform; and more. In addition, other issues are being discussed: school supplemental debt relief; charter school transparency.

Rep. Natalie Price, 5th District: in addition to issues mentioned by Rep. Weiss, telemedicine parity is a major issue gaining traction.

Rep. Jason Hoskins, 18th District: "Make It in Michigan Fund" is intended to attract and support new businesses. Other issues being discussed: energy package and pop-up tax (when buying a new home).
